Hiring Practices to Increase Diversity

Earlier this week, Lisa Richardson, Director of Human Resources, shared new hiring guidelines with the district's hiring managers. These new guidelines and practices, to be implemented immediately, will help us to increase the diversity of candidates applying for positions in the district. Central to our educational equity work is ensuring that the district's educators reflect the diversity of our student body. The wide ranging diversity of our students and families must be reflected in the educators who are working with them. These improvements to our hiring practices will strengthen our work over the past several years to improve our hiring processes so that we achieve our collective goal of increasing the diversity of the PSB staff. Collaboration with the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA)

On March 28, we hosted a meeting at the Pierce School with MSBA staff including Jim McDonald, Chief Executive Officer; Jack McCarthy, Deputy CEO and Executive Director; and Matt Donovan, Director of Administration and Operations. Joining me in the meeting were Helen Charlupski, Mary Ellen Dunn, Matt Gillis and Lesley Ryan Miller.

The meeting was an opportunity for us to bring the MSBA staff up-to-date on our current projects and plans, and give them a tour of the Pierce School so they could see first-hand some of the crowded conditions we are experiencing in the district. On Friday, April 6, the district submitted two Statements of Interest to MSBA for proposed projects at Pierce School and Driscoll School.

Runkle School Collaborative Time

I was invited to join educators at Runkle School during their collaborative time on Friday, April 6, as they engaged in a discussion of the book, *The Hate U Give!*, by Angie Thomas. Educators came prepared with a passage or quote from the book that had resonated with them and everyone joined in a thoughtful and powerful discussion. My thanks to Runkle educators Sarah Hahesy, Tanya Paris and Lauren Carroll for inviting me to share in this collaborative time work.

METCO Honors

We have two important updates to share from the METCO office. First, several Brookline METCO students joined Governor Baker, Lieutenant Governor Polito, and members of the Massachusetts Black and Latino Legislative Caucus for a moment of silence on the steps of the State House on April 4 to honor Martin Luther King, Jr. on the 50th anniversary of his death. Our students were wonderful representatives at this most somber event.

Second, the METCO central headquarters secured a scholarship for a student to study at the Island School in the Bahamas as part of a summer program in Maritime Studies. Following a competitive application process, we are thrilled to announce that a Brookline student, Autumn Johnson, won the scholarship! The summer program immerses students in field work in local ecosystems and invites students to grapple with questions of how to protect fragile island ecosystems so that island communities can live sustainably. Congratulations, Autumn, on this exciting opportunity!

Kinetic Sculptures: An 8th Grade Collaboration

On Monday, April 2, 8th grade students from Heath School displayed their kinetic sculptures and it was a sight to behold! The kinetic sculptures project was planned collaboratively among science, art, ECS and Ed Tech teachers, and it was so popular that they plan to run it again next year. The 4-week project had its roots in maker thinking/design thinking. Students started the project by taking a field trip to the MIT museum to see Arthur Ganson's kinetic sculptures. Back at school, they learned a lot about the physics of energy and simple machines, as well as how to draw observational and movement sketches and how to sketch out their designs. Each student chose what they wanted to build and how they wanted to build it. Teachers were available to provide feedback to student ideas and to offer tutorials on the use of various tools. It was truly a collaborative project. Thanks to ECS teacher Tanya Gregoire for inviting me to see these demonstrations and for providing this summary so that I could share this exciting news with you this evening.

Runkle Library to Sponsor Author Visit

On a hot summer night in the late 1980s, in the Boston neighborhood of Roxbury, a twelve-year-old African-American girl was sitting on a mailbox talking with her friends when she became the innocent victim of gangrelated gunfire. Amid public outcry, an immediate manhunt was on to catch the murderer, and a young African-American man was quickly apprehended, charged, and — wrongly — convicted of the crime. Dick Lehr, a former reporter for the *Boston Globe*'s famous Spotlight Team who investigated this case for the newspaper, now turns the story into *Trell*, a page-turning novel about the daughter of an imprisoned man who persuades a reporter and a lawyer to help her prove her father's innocence. What pieces of evidence might have been overlooked? Can they manage to get to the truth before a dangerous character from the neighborhood gets to them? Author Dick Lehr will be visiting Runkle on May 11 to meet with 7th and 8th graders to discuss his book.

Student Honors

Performing Arts Coordinator Kenny Kozol shared the following wonderful news with us about the Brookline Youth Orchestra (BYO): On Saturday, March 24, the BYO, one of our town-wide ensembles consisting of 4th through 8th graders from across all of our schools, participated for the first time in a competition sponsored by the Massachusetts Instrumental and Choral Conductors Association (MICCA). BYO participants in the adjudicated competition were awarded a gold medal for their performance and were one of 19 ensembles (out of 260) to be selected to perform at Symphony Hall in Boston based on their stellar work. The Brookline Youth Orchestra will perform at Symphony Hall on Saturday, April 21, performing JS Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 3 and Ravel's Sonatine. The BYO is conducted by John Ferguson and assisted by Emily Stewart, two of our music teachers. The work of the ensemble is impressive, working at an extremely high level and performing challenging original works (not simplified youth arrangements preferred by many student groups). Congratulations to Mr. Ferguson, Ms. Stewart and all of our students in the Brookline Youth Symphony, as well as to all of our music teachers who cultivate creative and musical skills in all of our students!

In an effort to increase the number of diverse candidates that are hired in the District, we are both adjusting our hiring process and increasing the number of places where our postings are advertised. We anticipate that these steps will increase the number of applicants and may therefore require a larger number of interviews during the search process.

Beginning immediately with hiring for the 2018-2019 school year, the changes will include the following:

- When the job posting closes, the HR department will forward a list of minority applicants who have applied for your openings. In the event that you have not received this list prior to selecting candidates for interview, call the HR department so this list of applicants can be provided. It is the expectation that the candidates on this list will be interviewed.
- When recommending a candidate to HR for hire, each hiring manager will be expected to complete an interview log listing all candidates that were interviewed.
- On the interview log, hiring managers will need to report why the minority candidate(s) interviewed were not hired for the position.

In order to ensure a comprehensive and inclusive search process, interview committees should include:

- The hiring manager for the position
- The appropriate curriculum coordinator
- Educators
- Parents
- For middle school and high school openings, it is recommended that a student also be considered for participation in the interview process.

It is the responsibility of the hiring manager to make every effort to ensure the hiring committee is reflective of the school's diversity.

The Human Resources department will send a list of possible interview questions to all hiring managers. Please refer to this bank of questions when developing the questions that will be used by your interview committee.

With respect to the posting of positions, the District is utilizing several sites in addition to Recruit and Hire/School Spring. Our postings will now appear on Nemnet, Diversity in Education and the National Minority Update which should garner additional minority candidates.
