Professional Development

Over the past several weeks, Director of Professional Development Gabe McCormick has been working with Facing History and Ourselves to provide professional learning opportunities related to discussing race with students. Topics will include both planned conversations about race (such as when racially charged topics are in the curriculum) as well as how to successfully facilitate unplanned conversations (which may arise as a result of local or national events). This work is being planned and provided in direct response to educator feedback from our November professional development day.

Mindy Paulo, Coordinator of the English Language Learner (ELL) program, developed a workshop for Brookline educators titled, "Understanding Islam and Muslims: Beliefs, Practices and Common Misconceptions". The workshop has generated significant interest across the district. The workshop will be led by Barbara Sahli, founder of Muslim Youth Voices, and will include topics such as the current context of Islamophobia, demographics of American Muslims, basic beliefs and practices of Islam, an examination of common misconceptions, and strategies to support Muslim youth. The workshop will also feature an interactive opportunity for participants to read and respond to narratives by Muslim youth about their experiences in the United States.

As we work to develop a comprehensive, multi-year approach, we will continue to offer powerful and meaningful learning opportunities like these described above that continue to move this important work forward.

Learning Walks

Continuing our work to build collaboration and learn from the vast expertise in our school system, a group of principals including Heidi Cook, Brian Denitzio, AC Sevelius and Warren Blair spent time visiting and learning from the Lawrence School team today. The highlights of their visit included the opportunity to observe the following:

- Students had opportunities to turn-and-talk with one another to discuss academic work
- Classrooms were student-centered
- Relationships between students and staff are strong
- Lesson objectives were shared with students
- Lessons were focused
- Evidence of collaboration and curriculum alignment cross grade levels
- Good use of informal assessment of student learning
- Implementation of Workshop Model
- Specific vocabulary instruction
- Use of anchor charts
- Common use of word walls across classrooms
- Movement breaks for students
- Opportunities for student choice in classroom activities
- Students were asked to make connections from text-to-text and text-to-self
- Technology use in instruction
- Students' personal lives were reflected in the classroom
- Evidence of differentiation

Deputy Superintendent Nicole Gittens and Senior Director for Elementary Teaching and Learning Lesley Ryan Miller also participated in this important learning opportunity.

Heath School and Runkle School Principal Search Update

I anticipate having final candidates for both of these important positions to present to the School Committee at the February 9 meeting.

The peer training program "prepares young people to use the positive power of peer influence to promote respect and civility in their schools and beyond." We look forward to the positive influence that the BHS peer trainers will have in strengthening the supportive and caring environment that already exists at BHS.

I would like to thank Brendan Kobus, Interim Associate Dean, and Jen Martin, Social Students teacher and coordinator of The Advisory Program, for their hard work coordinating this opportunity for our students. And, of course, thank you to the student volunteers for their commitment to this important work.

I have met with a working group of K-8 principals to develop a plan that will bring this work to the students in our middle grades.

9th Annual Young Women of Color Annual Retreat

Brookline's METCO program and African American Latino Scholars program (AALSP) hosted the 9th Annual Young Women of Color Retreat last Thursday at Emmanuel College. I was happy to be able to join the students during their mid-day break and attend the *Senior Panel* afternoon workshop.
