
The fall screening day is meant to help families better understand their child's development, and to determine if a special education evaluation is recommended.


### **Staffing Update**

#### **District Response**

One-to-one conversations: Staff are available for one-on-one conversations with students who may wish to discuss their thoughts, feelings, or concerns in a private setting.

**Safe Spaces:** Schools have identified safe spaces where students can take time to process their emotions and find solace.

Classroom Check-Ins: Classroom teachers, as part of our morning meeting for elementary/advisory for middle and high school portions of our day, have had check-ins with their students to provide an opportunity for open dialogue and to ensure that everyone feels heard and supported.

**Small Group Check-Ins**: Where appropriate and if needed, we have offered small group check-ins where students can share their thoughts and experiences with their peers in a safe and supportive environment.

We have shared social emotional strategies as well as tips/strategies for processing with young children with our educators.



# District Response: Teaching and Learning

#### Middle and High School Students

- Processing Attacks in Israel and the Outbreak of War in the Region: This activity from Facing History and Ourselves is
  designed to help students process violence, terror, and the loss of life in the wake of attacks in Israel and Israel's declaration
  of war against Hamas. The materials also include some straightforward background and ways to support students' media
  consumption.
- Resilience in a time of war: Tips for parents and teachers of middle school children: This piece from the American
  Psychological Association provides some tips that can help you teach your students resilience. As you use these tips, keep
  in mind that each child's journey along the road to resilience will be different and that your own knowledge of your students
  will guide you.

#### **Elementary Students**

- How to Talk to Your Children About Conflict and War: This piece from UNICEF provides some tips on how to approach
  the conversation with your students and to provide them with support and comfort. The information here is general in nature
  and could be used in future situations as well.

# District Response: Educational Equity

- The Office of Educational Equity (OEE) firmly believes the Public Schools of Brookline is a place for no hate. We understand that Hate speech denies the values of tolerance, inclusion, diversity, and the essence of human rights norms and principles.
- The Office of Educational Equity is reimagining and refining the current web page to ground that Equity is in the foundation and throughline of our work in the Public Schools of Brookline. We are reviewing policies and refining our incident reporting documents to ensure community members have a transparent reporting process that will be shared this week.

#### Bullying Prevention and Incident Reporting Form

The Public Schools of Brookline (PSB) is committed to providing a workplace and educational environment, as well as other benefits, programs, and activities, that are free from discrimination and harassment based on a protected category, and retaliation for engaging in a protected activity.

This form may be used to report any incident(s) of harassment, discrimination, bullying and/or retaliation involving members of the Public Schools of Brookline community. All staff members who witness or become aware of harassment, discrimination, bullying or retaliation by any student or staff member *must* inform the Principal/Head of School/Superintendent or their designee immediately.

You can choose to file this report anonymously. However, please be advised that reporting anonymously limits our ability to take disciplinary action in response to an incident(s).

This form will be received by the school administration(s) of the school(s) associated with the incident AND the PSB Office of Educational Equity.



#### District Response: Student Services

- Embed well-being and social emotional learning into all aspects of our educational programming in order to promote healthy students, schools, and communities. By integrating mental health education into the core curricula and proactively addressing mental health every day, we strive to identify and address challenges as early as possible.
- Students' needs are supported through established safe, caring spaces where they can express vulnerable feelings and
  receive validation and support. Normalizing conversations around mental health within such spaces creates a powerful,
  supportive environment for listening, sharing, and problem solving.
- Our clinical staff across all schools are trained to provide proactive emotional support to students and families. In the past
  several weeks, clinical teams have provided additional support to students who are experiencing increased worry, fear, and
  stress. We are also in the middle of our now routinized universal screening process, which provides students the opportunity
  to "Raise their Hands" for additional support (e.g., ask if they want an adult to follow up with them).
- During this immensely challenging time, we recognize and appreciate that students will reach out to a trusted staff person during the school day a building administrator, teacher, clinician, special educator, paraprofessional, nurse, related service provider, food service worker, custodian to name a few. We thank our staff for being a huge reason why students have felt safe coming to school. We will continue to highlight the ways that we are supporting children at school and the supports that are available to students whenever they need them. We continue to encourage you, our parents and guardians, to reach out to school staff whenever you have a concern as well. We recognize that our interconnectedness school, home, community is the key to facilitating information, building relationships, and ensuring a safe environment for learning.
