
- School leaders participated in emergency preparedness and active threat training with Brookline Police Department in July
 - School leaders have secured dates for school-based training with Brookline Police Department and school staff
- PSB submitted required school-based medical emergency response plans to DESE in mid-August

- Mask-Friendly Environment to begin the school year. Masks remain <u>required</u> inside all health offices.
 - Masks available at PSB schools for all students, staff, and visitors.
- Testing available at school for individuals who develop symptoms <u>during</u> the school day (Must complete consent).
- Individuals who test positive for COVID-19 must isolate for a minimum of 5 days.
 Individuals leaving isolation must wear a high-quality mask at school, and when around others, for the next 5 days (days 6-10).




- Vaccines continue to be the best way to protect individuals against the effects of COVID-19.
 - DESE and DPH strongly recommend that all faculty, staff, and students, including children ages 6 months 5 years, receive the COVID-19 vaccine primary series and all boosters as they become eligible for them.
- **COVID-19 Vaccine Clinics** will continued to be held at PSB schools throughout the school year.


- Will always be a number of students who register and then make different decisions come Fall



Competency Determination Updates

MCAS Changes (High School)

Board of Education Vote

- New passing standard for the Competency Determination for ELA, math and science
- Beginning with Class of 2026
- Enhancements to Educational Proficiency Plan (EPP) process for students who do not meet the cut score on the ELA or math MCAS

Rationale

- Current passing scores are equivalent to a performance level of *Not Meeting* Expectations
- High percentage of students who score Not
 Meeting Expectations are not well prepared for postsecondary success*

Particular EPP enhancements include:

- A requirement that the school provide a student's EPP to their parents/guardians on an annual basis
- A requirement to describe the tutoring (or other individual supports) the student will receive
- Establishment of different expectations for students successful progressing in Mass Core, approved Vocational-Tech programs or Early College program

BHS Results Spring 2021

ELA

489 test takers

- 23 students did not meet the 486 cut score (5%)
 - 20 were high needs students
- 6 students scored less than 470

Math

483 test takers

- 35 students did not meet the 486 cut score (7%)
 - 31 were high needs students
- 8 students scored less than 470

Results from last MCAS administration (Spring 2021) show that high needs students were more likely to fall below the updated cut score for passing without needing an EPP (486 scaled score)
