NEASC Visit at BHS

Brookline High School had a very successful decennial visit from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges' (NEASC) accreditation team from Monday, April 14 through Wednesday, April 16. This visit was a follow up two years after their Collaborative Conference visit in May of 2023. BHS worked with the original team and NEASC's director of accreditation to identify several priority areas for improvement at BHS.

One foundational element of school accreditation is school safety and security. The planning and implementation of BHS's access control system deeply impressed the decennial visit team. Their memorable quote from 2023 was, "This is a beautiful school and campus. Now lock it." BHS has succeeded in doing this, while allowing access to students, staff, families, and visitors.

There are three other areas where BHS has made substantial progress:

- Developing a Multi-tiered Systems of Support (MTSS), including major progress on the BHS Building Curriculum Accommodation Plan (BCAP). This goes live on our district and high school websites well in advance of the 2025-26 school year.
- Working on a common curriculum format within and across departments as well as more common assessment practices and structures. These intra and cross-department efforts began this year and will continue for the next two to three years.
- Structured, focused professional learning that helps teachers develop a core of strong
 instructional, assessment, and student support approaches, practices, and strategies.
 This was declared a focus area in 2023, and the decennial visiting team was impressed
 by the progress made on providing professional learning for educators.

One area that needs to be tackled with urgency in the next year is a district-wide vision of a graduate. The visiting team helped us think about ways this could look and be done efficiently and effectively.

Overall, it was a great visit. The Director of Accreditation has asked Head of School Anthony Meyer, social studies curriculum coordinator Jen Martin and English curriculum coordinator John Andrews to present to the NEASC Board of Directors on Friday, May 16,

- Town-Wide Jazz Band, directed by Rick Stone with assistant director Kenny Kozol, earned an Excellent rating and placed 2nd.
